The most obvious parallel on both occasions was the obvious delight on our students' faces as each one of them came forward to be acknowledged for an achievement or character strength. Thank you to our incredible staff who were pivotal in helping shape these learning journeys.

The story is told of two old friends met each other on the street one day. One looked forlorn, almost on the verge of tears. His friend asked, "What has the world done to you, my old friend?" The sad fellow said, "Let me tell you: three weeks ago, my uncle died and left me forty thousand dollars."

"That's a lot of money."

"But you see, two weeks ago, a cousin I never even knew died, and left me eighty-five thousand dollars, free and clear." "Sounds to me that you've been very blessed."

"You don't understand!" he interrupted. "Last week my great-aunt passed away. I inherited almost a quarter of a million from her."

Now the man's friend was really confused. "Then, why do you look so glum?" "This week . . . nothing!"

Our holidays are fast approaching. The end of the year is a great time to take stock of the goodness in our lives. To engage in the character strength of gratitude.

Gratitude is defined as thankfulness or feelings of appreciation that result from perceived fortune or kindness from others. To not take something or someone for granted, to appreciate what others do for us or to be happy with what we have.

Gratitude has a powerful effect on friendships and helps people feel valued and respected within the context of their relationships. Links are being made between gratitude and our health and wellbeing.

There can a problem with receiving something, especially when it is on a regular basis. Recognising our daily blessings has been found to have a powerful impact on people's satisfaction with their life experiences. As the story about the two old friends I told earlier suggested, even if it is a gift, we eventually come to expect it. The natural tendency is that if we receive a gift long enough, we come to view it almost as an entitlement. We feel hurt, even angry, if we do not receive it any longer.

Probably the most important message from me for my last newsletter article for 2017 is to ask our Elim Christian College community to help put the reason back into this season – to put Christ back into Christmas and in doing so, be grateful for the gift of His Son. A challenge I offer is that we pause long enough in the days leading up to Christmas Day to be grateful and understand something akin to what the healed thankful Leper experienced. To count our blessings this year, regardless of what the year has been like could well be the pushback to the over spending and the commercial hype of 'white' Christmases and Santas which are so often associated with the Season, *even* during our summer here.

In preparation for today's Generosity Project, the Year 5 students made:

Christmas crackers with chocolate, candy cane and mice crafts, beaded bracelets and decorated reindeer cookies which were all sold in an effort to financially support refugees coming to New Zealand.

Mrs Eng told us the story of how her husband immigrated to New Zealand as a refugee when he was 8 years old. He had to flee his country, Cambodia because of a corrupt Government and waited in Thailand until he was sponsored by an organisation to move to New Zealand. He lived in the Mangere Refugee Resettlement Centre for 6 weeks, learning about New Zealand life and culture. Now he has his own pharmacy business in Auckland.

Our Market Day was extremely popular, and we raised over \$260 towards the Refugee Centre in Mangere. The Year 5 students have learnt a lot during this project and now understand how their sacrifice can make a difference in our community!
