On the 1st & 2nd of April, Duncan Ramsey competed in the ARGOS Senior ART (Artistic Gymnastics) competition in Tauranga. This was a





qualifying event for the men's artistic gymnastics (MAG) National Championship. On day one he got a fabulous overall score of 70.957. On day two he got another amazing overall score of 72.898. He came first in hi-bar, rings and vault, placed third in p-bars and fourth on floor. Out of 6 competitors from all over the country Duncan came first overall in MAG Level 7. This is very impressive as it is also his first time competing at this event.

Duncan has also competed in the Counties Annual Kerrin Bishop Memorial Artistic Competition and did astoundingly. In this event, he came first overall, with a personal best score of 72.99! Ducan came first in p-bar, hi-bar, and vault, placed second on rings and third on floor. Congratulations Duncan Ramsey!
