YEAR 3 - SUPERHEROES



Our Year 3 Superheroes have had an exciting start to the term with some fantastic learning adventures across both Maths and Inquiry!

Geometry - Shape Detectives!

In Maths, we've been exploring 2D shapes and learning how to describe them using the number of sides and vertices. The students have been using precise mathematical language to talk about what they see and compare different shapes – becoming real shape detectives!

Habitat Detectives - Exploring Biomes around the World

Our new Inquiry topic has taken us across the world to explore different biomes – large natural environments where specific animals and plants live. So far, we've visited the grasslands and the desert. Each week, we'll dive into a new biome, gathering clues and asking questions to understand how living things survive in different conditions.

The children are doing an amazing job making connections in their learning and sharing information, photographs and videos of family trips to different parts of the world, and we love seeing their enthusiasm and wonder grow with each new discovery.

Gymnastics:

Our young gymnasts have been busy developing their balance, coordination, and confidence during our recent gymnastics sessions! This week, students have been exploring the balancing beam, learning how to move with control, focus, and poise. They've also had a chance to try out the springboard, using it to practise safe jumping and landing techniques.

Alongside our equipment work, students have been enjoying independent skipping practise, challenging themselves to improve rhythm, timing, and stamina.

It's been fantastic to see their determination and joy as they master new skills






YEAR 3 - SUPERHEROES














YEAR 4

Through this, we'll be exploring symbiosis, how plants and animals in the grasslands and savannah depend on one another to survive.

Sienna and Genna's design is called 'Nature Preserved'. They used used sustainable materials such as old fabrics, flour and water glue, dried leaves, and plants to make their garment.
