

READING TIPS FROM MRS WILSON: STRUCTURED LITERACY

The New Zealand Curriculum refresh includes a stronger emphasis on structured literacy approaches, and you may have heard the phrase in the news over the last couple of years. But what exactly is Structured Literacy and why is it important for our tamariki?

Structured Literacy

Helping Children Crack the Code of English



What is it?

Structured Literacy is a step-by-step way of teaching children how to read and spell. We teach them how the English code works, so they can figure out words — not guess them.



How it works

- 1. Explicit teaching We explain exactly what to do and why
- Systematic order Skills are taught in a clear sequence, so nothing is missed
- Cumulative learning Each lesson builds on what was learned before
- Multi-sensory practice-Children see it, hear it, say it, and write it to make it stick



Why it helps with reading

- Children can read new words without guessing
- Reading becomes smoother and more enjoyable
- Understanding patterns makes reading easier



Why it helps with spelling


- Children learn the rules and patterns of English spelling
- They can spell new words by working them out, not just memorising
- It builds long-term accuracy and confidence


READING TIPS FROM MRS WILSON: DECODING


Decoding is an important skill that needs to be mastered in order to read.

When children get good at decoding, it helps with:

- 1. Reading unfamiliar words they can figure them out instead of guessing.
- 2. Reading fluency words become easier and quicker to read, freeing up brain space for understanding.
- 3. Spelling knowing sound-letter patterns helps them spell new words.
- 4. Vocabulary growth they can read and learn new words they haven't heard before.
- 5. Confidence reading feels less like a guessing game and more like a skill they can enjoy.









READING TIPS FROM MRS WILSON: READING AT HOME





There is a lot you can do to be a reading role model:

- Read books, magazines, comics, articles…let your kids see you reading
- Have other family / whānau members show how they read too. Boys especially need reading role models e.g. seeing dad read and dad reading to them
- Chat about what you're reading and be interested in your child's reading and books
- Take them to the public or school library


