
Alongside this, we've been enjoying a range of festive maths and literacy activities to keep our learning fun and Christmassy!




















In Year Three, the students have been learning about protecting New Zealand's native birds. We took a local walk and saw a wide variety of native birds, such as tūī, fantails and pūkeko, as well as wētā hotels and nectar feeders. We published recounts about our 'Habitat Detectives Walk' and drafted persuasive writing about why we should protect the environment to care for our native birds.

The children have been making nectar and seed bird feeders and bird houses in STEM, some of which will go in the school garden among the flax bushes. Students have learned skills such as safely hammering nails into wood and using a hot glue gun to construct their designs. They have also designed posters to encourage their whānau and the school community to protect native bird habitats.



















The Year 4 students have been exploring the theme of Sustainability in Inquiry. We've been learning how to make our own backyards more sustainable and inviting for native birds, helping to ensure their survival for the future. As part of STEM, students designed and constructed bird feeders using recycled materials, and even learnt how to safely and accurately hammer in a nail. We can't wait to see these creations in action!

In Mathematics, our focus has been on Geometry, particularly lines, 2D shapes, and 3D objects. Students took part in hands-on challenges using nets to build their own 3D shapes. This required careful thinking, spatial reasoning, and perseverance—skills that are essential in maths. Although it looked simple at first, the process was surprisingly tricky, and we are proud of how determined the students were as they worked to complete their final designs.



































YEAR 5 - KELLY TARLTON'S TRIP

Our Year 5 students had a fantastic learning experience at Kelly Tarlton's Sea Life Aquarium! The trip was filled with excitement as we explored the amazing underwater world and discovered many of the wonderful sea creatures in God's beautiful creation.

Students also learned about the importance of ocean sustainability and how we can all play a part in protecting marine life and keeping our oceans clean. It was a day full of learning, wonder, and gratitude for the incredible world God has made!

On Monday the 10th of November, the Year 6s went to Rainbow's End as a thank you for our service to the junior school before we head off to the middle years.
