YEAR 0 & 1

The year 0 & 1 student's inquiry focus this term is 'living things!' They did an interesting experiment with flowers and dye. The year 0 and 1 students talked about how the water travels from the roots in plants and then into the leaves and flowers. They looked at the meaning of 'xylem' and how this special plant-like tissue inside the stem, helps the water move up the plant. After just 24 hours they came back to an exciting array of colours and observed that the flowers and leaves had turned blue, red and yellow. What a great learning experience they had!













We also had a Wacky Wednesday this week. The children and teachers had fun dressing up in some interesting ways - odd socks, odd shoes, wearing clothes backwards, wacky hairstyles and many other creative outfits. The daily routine was turned upside down and the classroom was rearranged with tables wearing socks or shoes and chairs wearing dress ups. We read the book Wacky Wednesday by Dr Seuss.

YEAR 4 ZOO TRIP

In Year 4 we have been learning about world biomes. This week our students visited the Auckland Zoo where we learnt about the adaptations that different grassland animals make to live in their unique biome. We have connected this to how God designs each animal uniquely to exist in its habitat. The students learnt that lions use their tails as fly swats among many other interesting facts. Giraffes get a lot of water from eating leaves because they are at risk from predators when they stoop to drink water close to the ground. Meerkats have in built shades that act as sunglasses to protect their eyes from the sun. They also take turns to be the sentry, which means one individual will stand at the highest lookout while the rest of the group looks for food. When they sense danger, they will bark which signals for all the meerkats to either get out or get in, depending on what and where the danger is. The students will now turn their focus towards creating their own grasslands diorama to bring together all of the amazing knowledge they have gathered.

READING TIPS FOR PARENTS

How to help your child as they begin their reading journey...

Read more!

- Read TOGETHER as much as you can
- POINT to the words: this will help your child match the words with
- Let them SEE you reading, TALK about interesting facts or ideas you read about in the news, at work or in your nighttime novel
- Read a VARIETY of texts: fiction, nonfiction, poetry, letters, print in the environment etc


Research tells us that young children whose parents read to them daily have been exposed to at least 290,000 more words by the time they enter school than kids who aren't read to regularly. All that exposure is likely to make it easier for kids to expand their vocabularies and understand the variety of texts they'll need to read as they get older, both inside school and out.

Make reading fun!

- Give lots of ENCOURAGEMENT when your child is learning to read
- Keep reading time POSITIVE and RELAXING, for some children learning to read is hard







In the beginning stages of reading, your child may need help with decoding. (sounding out unknown words). Older students might need help too, as learning the many patterns of the English Code may take some time and lots of practice and encouragement.

- Help your child sound out new words e.g. b-a-g or sh-ir-t
- If they don't know a word, help them with the sounds or read it

For older children: make them lifelong readers...

- · Take them to the library to pursue their interests, books about rugby or cooking, sewing or caring for animals
- · Set aside time when everyone turns off
- the TV and devices and makes time for reading
- Read the book and watch the movie, make popcorn and have a movie night
- · Make reading a regular and enjoyable part of your family routine

Ask questions, make predictions and connections:

- · Discuss how the book makes your child feel
- Compare and contrast the main characters in the story
- Draw parallels between characters and real life situations faced by kids
- Draw parallels between characters in the story and those in books read previously
- Discuss "what-if" scenarios and make predictions about what happens next
- Discuss "what would you do if this happened to you?" scenarios
- · Talk about what a character did and what it tells you about her
