Welcome to this week's newsletter. We are nearly at the halfway point of this 10 week term. Where did the time go? This week I visited two of our teachers, Miss Fale in Room 5 and Miss Chester in Room 7. It is always an inspiration to see young teachers at work – their passion, commitment and care of students under the mentorship of experienced teachers is outstanding.



Each student in turn from Miss Fale's class presented a speech. The student in the photo spoke clearly for 2min 19sec without reference to notes on the need to be considerate to animals. At the conclusion of each speech the class was invited to give positive feedback. Many skills were at work here. Listening skills and analysis from the listeners and of course the building of confidence and skills of public speaking. How many of us could speak when we were that age in front of a class? Not me for sure! Thank you, Miss Fale, for building a class environment that enabled this to happen.

In Miss Chester's class, the students were given 3 minutes to write down as many countries as they could remember. The overall class average was 55 countries and the top score was 85! On another related exercise, the students were working on task sheets concerning the coming election- identifying leaders of political parties and the process of New Zealand's voting system. How reassuring to know that our young students are aware and engaged in the issues of the world around them. Thank you, Miss Chester, for your part in shaping these students to be informed and prepared global citizens.

#### **PAT HANLY CREATIVITY AWARDS**

On Thursday 10 August, Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki hosted The Pat Hanly Creativity Awards, recognising 70 exceptional Senior art students from the secondary schools throughout the Auckland region. The award recognises secondary school students who display high levels of creativity in the visual arts.

From Elim Christian College Mt Albert Campus, two amazing Year 13 art students, Emilia Malcolm and Jonathan Schnee received the award in the presence of their whānau and teacher and were honoured at a gala event at Auckland Art Gallery Toi o Tāmaki.

"Art and creativity are important to me because of their impact on society. Art in itself is essentially self expression but usually extends itself beyond the creator. Art is meant to be seen and experienced by others and thereby has great potential to impact them. Art is used to convey certain ideas and experiences to others through creating emotion. #### **KBB MUSIC FESTIVAL**

Our Elim Chamber Ensemble is made up of students from our Mt. Albert and Botany campuses and is directed by Mrs Karen Liu. Throughout the year they have been rehearsing separately and in the Term 2 holidays had three intensive workshops as a combined group.

The KBB Music Festival is the largest festival of its kind in the country and features big bands, orchestras, concert bands and chamber orchestras. Last week we performed in the chamber orchestra division. The Elim Chamber Ensemble put on their best performance to date and was awarded a bronze award. An excellent result as their first time entering as a competitive group.

Part of this festival is offering students from all the schools involved the opportunity to play in a combined schools orchestra and big band. Scarlett Ploeg was selected to be part of the orchestra on cello and performed Gareth Farr's 'From the Depths of the Great Sea Gong.' This is a piece of music that even professional orchestras rarely play because of the difficulty. Calitin Diprose was selected to be part of the big band on bass and performed two charts 'It Could Happen To You' and 'A Foggy Day.' Bass is probably the most essential instrument in a big band and she nailed it.

#### WORLD VISION


